Dear Wiley:

Since we are not corner grocers pursuing cut-throat competition, but are engaged in a common enterprise - that of trying to analyze and solve complicated intellectual problems by joint endeavor - I want to enlist your help in the Oklahoma liquor case.

Specifically, I should like you to tell me two things:

- 1. What basis is there for suggesting, other than Judge Phillips' argument, that its Act of 1917 is not the law of Oklahoma?
- 2. Judging the matter, as we should, by the point of view expressed in the <u>Penn Dairies</u> case, 318 U. S. 361, is there any good reason for suggesting that the Oklahoma Act of 1917 is not incorporated by reference in the Assimilative Crimes Statute of 1940?

I put these questions in an eager endeavor to avoid all the avoidable differences of opinion amongst us. If you would like to talk about these questions I am of course at your disposal.
