Dear Mr. Orrick:

The Department is pleased to be informed that Mr. Lawrence M. Greene, an employee of the Securities and Exchange Commission, has been awarded a Rockefeller Public Service Award for 1957. Mr. Armstrong's letter of April 1, 1957, informed us that Mr. Greene intends to study for a six-month period in the United Kingdom and in the principal centers of Western Europe, and that he desires to interview and consult with investment bankers, industrialists, government officials and other experts.

The Department is of course greatly interested in his proposed study of the foreign investment company as a medium for American investment abroad, and will be pleased to inform the Foreign Service posts of the United States in the various cities which Mr. Greene proposes to visit and to request that appropriate courtesies be extended to him. The Department will also request the posts to lend their efforts in arranging, wherever appropriate, meetings between Mr. Greene and those officials with whom he desires to arrange appointments.

You request that some arrangement be made through the Department of Defense to permit Mr. Greene's children to attend an American dependents' high school in France where he expects to base his family. The Department recommends that Mr. Greene look into this matter on a personal basis and suggests that he communicate with the Administrative Officer in the American Embassy in Paris, Mr. Gerald S. Bushnell, for further information and guidance. Mr. Bushnell has been advised of the problem informally by letter, and will be exploring the matter.

I understand that Mr. Greene has given Mr. Hamlin Robinson of my staff a rough outline of his itinerary and the places he intends to visit which we shall use as a guide in informing our posts abroad.
